
SCREW THREADING DEMO

Bob Rupp was faced with a dilemma - how to get a tight fit on box tops while allowing easy removal: "So I made a thread cutter," he said at the February Show and Tell. He made it sound easy. In March, he showed how easy it could be in a demo.

Eschewing hand-chasing threads (tools are expensive, steep learning curve) and commercially available thread cutting devices (way too expensive), he explained the development of what he called his "Redneck Thread Cutter."

It starts with a star cutter which is mounted into a collet chuck on the lathe spindle. A cross-slide table is mounted on the lathe bed - Bob fashioned his out of MDF. Mounted on that is an apparatus which allows a threaded rod to be turned by hand on an axis parallel to the spindle. In this case, the 8 TPI on a 1" rod matched the chuck adapter used to hold the part to be threaded. The pictures show the setup of the device. It is carefully adjusted to allow a 0.050" deep cut on the surface to be threaded. For lidded boxes, he turns the mating portions with a 0.150" overlap to allow for thread thickness.

The thread cut matches the thread of the adapter rod, in this Continued on Page 3

case, 8 TPI. Later in the demo, he showed another adapter he made which uses 16 TPI x 3/4" rod and will produce 16 TPI. To show how easy to use the system is, he guided BAT President, Susan Shane, through the process.

Bob's presentation was relaxed, humorous, and thorough; in short, delightful. He cut many feet of thread in White wood, Yellow wood, and Brown wood. We appreciate all the effort he put into preparing and presenting the demo. His creativity was inspiring and I wouldn't be surprised to see screw threads popping up in future Show and Tells. Thanks, Bob. Great job!
