
Don Schultz gave detailed instruction in pen turning, starting with blanks, ending with a finished pen. Others took turns learning skew technique.

Bob Rupp demonstrated his spiraling jig. This was an intricate device incorporating his minilathe, a Dremel with a spiral router bit, drawer slides, cables, and cranks to cut spirals in turned items. He uses spiral router bits from 1/16"-1/8" diameter. After sanding, he fills the spiral grooves with Elmer's Carpenter's Wood Filler or Seam Fill (Formica filler) colored with dye.



DETAILS OF SPIRALING JIG


















RAFFLE NEWS
