# Craig Timmerman - Torus Vase

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BALTIMORE AREA

The January BAT meeting was a demonstration by Craig Timmerman on his signature Torus Vase. Craig is a full time woodturner living in Austin, Texas.

The Torus Vase is a variation that actually started with the shape below. Craig calls these Axe Head Vases, because the ends come to an edge like a double bit axe.





Craig refers to the vases below as Shelf Torus's because the bottoms are flat to sit on a shelf.

Other variations Craig has produced using the Torus shape are the lamp on the right. The sculptural piece below, and the base for the clocks as well.

#### Inlay:

Craig uses primarily Mesquite for his pieces. Mesquite always has a lot of cracks, often times very small. He uses a rotary tool to open up the small cracks so they can accept filler.

He uses manmade turquoise from tuckersturnings.com. He recommends buying the three separate sizes; chips, medium, and powder instead of buying the blended product. He fills the largest cracks first using the chips, then followed by medium, and finishing with powder.

He uses superthin CA glue for most pieces and on bowls he uses Epoxy. He recommends using Bond-Optic epoxy instead of 5 minute epoxy, especially when using colored inlays. Five minute epoxy is not UV stable and will yellow very quickly. Bond-Optic epoxy is UV stable and will not yellow. One drawback with the Bond-Optic epoxy is that it takes a very long time to setup. It takes 7 hours to setup and if you aren't careful it will run out of the crack before it sets up. You have to wait 2 days before you can sand it and it takes 7 days before it's fully cured.

To fill large voids, he uses West System Epoxy with a filler. He uses filler #407 to strengthen repairs on large voids and filler #410 for small voids and bug holes.

#### Other Items:

Craig recommends using Shurtape Indoor/Outdoor carpet tape for reverse chucking the Trorus form. The tape is available at Lowes. Leave the piece in contact with the tape, under pressure of the tailstock for several minutes to allow it to setup. The tape is heavier than most double sided tapes, you can use mineral spirits to remove residue of the tape when you remove it.
