# ECHOES FROM THE "BAT" CAVE



## May - Trent Bosch / Sunburst Platter

Trent Bosch demonstrated his Sunburst Platter for the May BAT meeting.

Trent went over his process of turning a platter with a wide rim suitable for a variety of embellishments.

The platter below is an example of three variations of carving he demonstrated.



The first tool that Trent starts any carving project with is a pencil. He sketches his design and doesn't worry about making every mark absolutely perfect. It's a hand made object and variation gives the piece character. He carefully selects the position of his design to allow any flaws in the wood to be cut away as part of the design.

Trent used a Chicago Pneumatic CP7900 air powered body saw with an 18 tpi blade to sculpt the profiled edge of the platter.





He used an Automach reciprocating carver with a Flexcut V gouge to relief cut the sketched details. A Junifer Pnematics angled die grinder with a 2 inch 80 grit pad

allowed for further undercutting. If you look at the platter above, the petals at the top appear to overlap because of the undercutting.



Trent discussed additional techniques, such as, carving lines and geometric shapes. He also spoke about the effects of burning or painting, either before or after carving.

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### May - Trent Bosch (continued)

#### **Final Thoughts:**

There were two items Trent demonstrated that I found particularly interesting. The first was that he rough turns the exterior of a form turning left handed. This is to direct the stream of shavings away from his body. Definitely a skill worth

developing!

The second thing that struck me was that he started the piece between centers. I think it's easy to forget the simple benefit of being able to position a piece exactly as you want it while



it is between centers. I like to create plates starting with a relatively thin piece of wood. Starting between centers would allow the piece to be positioned to best align the face of the plate before turning and maximize the wood.

### July - Ed Cohen / Saturn Bowl

Our July demonstration was by BAT's very own Ed Cohen. If you missed his demonstration it is available under the Video section of the BAT website. I highly recommend it.




Ed gave a fantastic demonstration on creating a very challenging piece. He does an excellent job breaking down the steps of a very complex project, pointing out the critical steps along the way.

I liked the simple steps he covered that we can all implement in our own projects, such as his shop made depth gauge and using a triangle on the ways as a visual guide when undercutting the ring.



I also liked that there are no special tools required to create this piece. Ed discussed making an ultra-thin parting tool from a painters "5 in 1" tool, available at any hardware store. Who doesn't like a new tool, and this one comes with the satisfaction of making it yourself!


